A Message From **REV. DR. JARED WITT** Transitional Pastor

Dear Second Family,

This is my second annual letter. Transitional pastors don't usually get more than that! What a delight it's been to learn and grow and worship and work with all of you these past two years. The primary "transition" work we needed to do has happened: Second has processed the past and has turned towards the future with hope and excitement. I have no doubt that God will call a gifted pastor to be with you all in what's next. But I'm also convinced that who the next leader is will be less important than the spirited congregation they will be serving.

In some ways, pastoral work hasn't changed all that much in a hundred years. I plan for regular worship, preaching, and teaching. I moderate our Session and guide several committee ministries. I lead classes for new members and arrange with parents to baptize children. I listen and pray with people who are overwhelmed, confused, angry, sad, and sick. In spite of these enduring rhythms, the cultural context in which we gather as a "good news" community is decidedly different than it was a hundred years ago. So we are called to continue to innovate and experiment: Be the Church Sundays and Block Party Saturdays; Front Porch Concerts and Art on Oak; Book Groups and Second Sunday lunches; road trips and museum visits.





I continue to be impressed by the varied ways Second cultivates opportunities to explore the good news of God's love for us in Jesus Christ. I treasured shared worship with our friends at Covenant Presbyterian and The Open Table. I took a maiden voyage through Journey to Bethlehem. I joined Pat Groshong and our kids during "Worship Alive." I learned about the inspiring good work being done in our neighborhood from black journalists at the KC Defender, from Councilwoman Melissa Robinson, and from Father Justin at Reconciliation Services. I've also loved those rare Sunday mornings when I have time to slip into the Covenant Class (deep, rigorous, thoughtful, and caring) or the Second Thoughts Class (God help them - they have unfortunately lashed themselves to the task of deciphering the previous week's sermon).

During January I've been teaching an online course called "Ecclesial Imagination" for Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. One of my primary roles in the course is to help students explore how their various traditions – Presbyterian, Episcopal, Baptist, Methodist, Lutheran, UCC, or Pentecostal – understand "ordained" ministry. Teaching this course reminds me how unique it is that we Presbyterians "ordain" not just pastors, but elders and deacons as well. Here at Second you're part of an experiment in shared leadership and collaborative path-making. We Presbyterians are known for doing things "decently and in order." That's (mostly) true. It's also messy, interesting and fun - as we keep step with the Spirit dancing among us.

I am deeply grateful for the privilege of serving alongside you. The path forward will require the very best from everyone at Second. In the next year or two, Second will need to balance responsibility and joy, resource allocation and gladness. That is, Second will need to foster organizational sustainability and to inspire life transformation at the same time. I have two promises for you. 1) It won't be boring, and 2) the living Christ – source and sustainer of our lives – will be with us all the way through.

A Message From REV. DR. KRISTIN RIEGEL Associate Pastor

Dear Second Family,

What a year 2023 has been! In January, we gathered with our friends at Covenant Presbyterian Church for a joint worship service filled with soulful jazz music and a combined choir that sang with gusto and brought the house (church?) down. In Lent, almost 60 adults gathered in C3 small groups to build relationships and discuss how to practice peace in their lives.

In October, 39 artists displayed their artwork at Art on Oak as over 400 visitors stopped by to visit and meet local artists. And in December, Journey to Bethlehem was relaunched and the story of God's love for the world made known in the birth of Jesus Christ was creatively retold to over 450 community guests, thanks to a dedicated team of volunteers.

As I reflect on this past year, one of the special highlights was the Lenten Peace Crane Project. During Lent, children with nimble fingers and older members with wrinkled hands, people who were origami masters and those who had never folded a crane before, gathered around tables during coffee hour, at kitchen tables in their homes, and with friends at school to create the cranes. Each crane was beautiful on its own, but together, the cranes were breath-taking. On Easter Sunday, nearly 600 peace cranes in the shape of a dove floated high above our sanctuary, proclaiming the beauty and joy of Christ's resurrection.



The Lenten Peace Crane Project, like many of our ministries and events, was the result of people--young and old, new to Second and long-time members--working together. Through creative collaboration, we were able to create something bigger, bolder, and more beautiful than any of us could on our own.

This is what the church is all about. It's about coming together, sharing our gifts, building relationships, and proclaiming God's peace, justice, and joy in beautiful and breathtaking ways. It's about being part of God's creative work in the world and having fun in the process!

As you read through our annual report, I hope you'll be inspired as you hear stories about the ways God's spirit is at work, drawing us into creative community, leading us toward justice, and filling us with courage to work for a more equitable world. And I hope that if you see a ministry that excites you, you'll jump in and join us in this work in the year ahead, so we can continue to build and be a community that proclaims God's joy, justice, and love.

- Led congregation and presbytery efforts to remove language from the Book of Order, part of the PC(USA)'s constitution, allowing churches to discriminate based on gender identity and sexual orientation.
- Sponsored a potluck dinner raising over \$16,000 to support the local resettlement of a 14-member Afghan family that fled their homeland because they would not cooperate with the Taliban.
 While these funds went toward the purchase of three vehicles for the family, in-kind and other contributions were also made to assist with their move to KC.
- Awarded a total of \$30,000 in Community Partner Grants to: Covenant Food Pantry, Reconciliation Services, The Open Table, and Friends of PEB (Presbyterian Education Board), and worked to engage the congregation with these ministries.
- Hosted the Executive Directors of the PEB and Friends of PEB over the weekend of a very memorable World Communion Sunday, providing opportunities for the congregation to learn about and engage with their mission (providing quality education to children in Pakistan). M25 also donated funds to support scholarships for seven students in PEB schools.
- Provided a total of \$6000 in Daniels Fund Educational Assistance Awards to five recipients (out of 37 applicants).
- Organized a successful Be the Church Sunday, with 127 participants from ages nine months to mid-80s. Over 190 volunteer hours were spent giving back to the community through six different organizations, as well as providing care to members of our own congregation.
- Formalized Second's relationship with More Light Presbyterians and the Covenant Network by including these organizations in our church's mission giving.
- Began work on the formation of an Earth Care Team, starting with Session's adoption of the PC(USA)'s Earth Care Pledge.



BUILDING & GROUNDS

BUILDING ASSESSMENT

The Building Assessment has been completed, and the report will serve as a roadmap to help us plan and budget for repairs, replacements, and upgrades to various building systems, such as HVAC. Summary reports and action item spreadsheets have been completed for the Building Envelop and Site, HVAC, and Electrical/Lighting. Reports will be distributed electronically to Session following the January meeting.

NITTY-GRITTY PROJECTS

Air Handling Units

Two air handling units (AHUs) on the 3rd floor have been replaced. One of these AHUs had a burst water line in January 2022, draining 600 gallons of water into the ECLC area and other parts of the building. Both units were 29 years old, and the remaining unit was nearing the end of its life, so we replaced both (a 5+ week job). It has been a long and challenging process, but the new equipment has been installed and is expected to serve the building for another 30 years.

Water Damage Repairs

All repairs needed after the water damage have been completed, including patching and painting walls, replacing flooring, and replacing damaged ceiling tiles.

Chiller Replacement

The existing chiller (serving the Sanctuary, Community Room, and Office) failed unexpectedly. The new chiller has been installed and is working well.

Energy-Efficient HVAC

Where old HVAC equipment was removed, it's been replaced with energyefficient equipment to help ensure more affordable heating and cooling bills going forward.

North Parking Lot

The North parking lot is lit again, and we successfully addressed a concern with our Crestwood Condo neighbors about a glare from one of the lights.

Sprinkler System

The sprinkler system has been clearly marked to identify which valves control which sections of the sprinkler system, a big help to staff and contractors.



BUILDING & GROUNDS

"ROOM H"

Room H, at the top of the stairs to the 2nd floor, is now a treasure trove of Second's history, including original drawings of the building from 1914, Session minutes dating back to the start of Second, photos, and much more. (Thank you, Leslie Anderson, for this incredible effort!)

- Most of the previously catalogued items have been placed into acid-free file folders and then into their respective acid-free archival storage boxes. Several more boxes of materials were retrieved from the basement last fall and will be examined, catalogued, and moved into acid-free storage systems soon.
- The Hage Endowment grant has been used for the purchase of archival storage materials and to pay for the matting and framing of two architectural drawings from 1914-1916 that will be on display in the two history rooms.

MORE FUN PROJECTS

Accessible Seating

Additional Accessible Seating has been provided in the Sanctuary.

Oak Tree Removed

One of the trees along Oak was removed due to disease. Sadly, the tree had become a liability (losing large limbs during stormy weather). However, the East face of the building is much more visible now and looks great.

ECLC Nursery Floor

New flooring in the ECLC Nursery has been installed and is low maintenance (no waxing required)! This will now be the standard for future updates.

Choir Restroom

The restroom next to the Choir Room has been painted and cabinets were built to conceal the hot water heater (Thank you, Stacy Hunter and Richard Ridge!)

FINANCE & STEWARDSHIP

- Conducted a successful stewardship campaign, receiving more pledges than the prior year
- Had strong market gain in our endowment and managed endowment services to save substantial administrative costs
- Supported unexpected capital building repairs of new air handlers, chiller and boiler
- Hired an external CPA firm to conduct a full audit of our 2023 books to engage in transparent financial reporting to the congregation
- Oversaw adjustments to the presentation of Second's financial and operating statements, along with certain financial operating policies, to better reflect our financial position and endowment allocations
- Managed points earned on the church credit card to apply \$1,800 towards the high school Service and Learning trip to Belize
- Launched the (ongoing) Heart of the Home campaign to purchase new kitchen appliances in order to continue our cooking ministries, raising over \$40,000 in December





Second Presbyterian Statement of Financial Position

As of December 31, 2023
